Big things are coming to 95th Street and Halsted Street as two new Pulse Lines move into the design phase!

Pace has worked closely with the City of Chicago's Department of Planning and Development and the CTA on the 95th Street Corridor Plan, which studied and set a vision for an area that will be served by both the Pulse 95th Street and Halsted Lines. As a first step, on March 2, 2025, Pace launched a pilot to expand service on Route 381, the current route serving 95th Street. Service will run every 15 minutes for most of the day, laying the groundwork for the future Pulse Line.




